Stewardship Moment

Day 11- You must serve God with money, not the other way around.

Matthew 6:24

"No one can serve two masters. Either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and Money.

A young Christian, full of passion and zeal, once said in his heart, I am going to make a lot of money so I can be a huge help to the kingdom of God. I may not be the one that goes on the missions, but, I can pay for those that will. So, inspiring to great financial gain, he dedicated himself to college and the pursuit of a degree that could make his dream happen. He was very good at what he did and succeeded in landing a good job after graduation. But, something went wrong.

At some point, he stopped wanting to give. While he was a student and working part time, he found giving to be very easy, for the amounts he faithfully gave were not large amounts. Once he began earning larger amounts of money, he found it hard to give in the same manner he once had. The large checks he wrote in the beginning he only did so with great difficulty. Over time, he found that he would much rather keep the money than give it away. After a long journey, he ended up doing exactly the opposite of what he had hoped to do. His generosity had faded into a tight-fisted cheapness; his passionate heart had been burdened down by the worries of the money he earned.

What happened to this man? Jesus taught in Matthew 6:24 that a Christian cannot have two masters. If he tries, he will only truly serve one of his masters, the other he will despise. Specifically, Jesus said that you cannot serve both God and money. In this case, the man stopped serving God and began serving money. At some point, he decided that he would rather have all the money he was earning than serve the God he set out to please. Money is a good thing when used in accordance with God's will. When we begin to seek out money without submitting its use to God and his word, then we begin to let money be our master.

Many people mistakenly think God is there to help us get wealthy. This is the greatest misunderstanding of who God is. What we need to realize is that God will not be used make us money; but, money can be used to honor God.

The vision of R.Y.A.N. is to live in a community that is aware and educated about the disease of addiction, where there is no stigma attached to it, and be a place where every person will have access to all necessary resources when seeking recovery.

R.Y.A.N. purchased the former Knights of Columbus building in Saugerties. They are renovating the property into a self-sustaining safe, sober, supportive home for individuals who are in recovery and are working to establish themselves back into the community.


The United States will soon go to the polls in one of the most hotly contested elections in living memory. Yet many Christians are ambivalent about it. Some people think that politics and faith don't mix, but I would say that misunderstands God's nature. If your God is not interested in politics then you are not worshipping the God of the Bible. Take the Lord's Prayer for example. In it we pray that God's Kingdom would come - that is a politically loaded prayer. It is asking that the reign of God would come to fruition here on earth as it is currently in heaven. We pray not that souls would escape up to heaven, but for God's kingly reign to invade our world. Of course, politics is far more than voting in general elections. We seek God's reign for every second of our Christian lives, not just for one day every four years. So in one sense voting is the very least we can do. It is us, as believers, playing our part in the democratic process that we have been invited to participate in.

Here are 10 reasons why Christians should vote:

- 1. Voting publicly recognizes that we submit to the authority of the political system in our nation as established by God. (Romans 13:1-7)
- 2. Voting recognizes the equality of all people and their right to speak and be heard. (Deuteronomy 10:17-19)
- 3. It is one way that we can obey God's command to seek the good of those around us and our nation as a whole. (Jeremiah 29:5-6)
- 4. It shows that we care deeply about who our leaders are as we are urged to offer prayer and intercession on their behalf. (1 Timothy 2:1,2)
- 5. It is a simple yet significant way we can do something about politics in our nation. 'All that is required for evil to prevail is for good men to do nothing', Edmund Burke. (Psalms 34:14)
- 6. It makes a difference the way a grain of salt makes a difference, and that is how we are to influence our society for good. (Matthew 5:13)
- 7. It is a privilege not to be taken for granted. Those of us who reap the benefits of living in a democracy should play a part in upholding democracy.
- 8. Not voting is a form of voting, as it will influence the outcome. We need to take responsibility for our actions, as well as our lack of actions. (Luke 10:25-37)
- 9. Voting has biblical precedence for example Acts 14:23 describes that the early Christians elected elders by voting.
- 10. Voting is part of our stewardship to use all the resources we have been given in ways that honor God; to waste a vote is to squander a gift.

MOVIES WITH SPIRIT

Nov. 16, ONE LIFE (2023), Woodstock Jewish Congregation, 1682 Glasco Turnpike, Woodstock — This drama, starring Anthony Hopkins, tells the incredible true story of a young



London stockbroker, Nicholas Winton (Johnny Flynn), who rescued 669 children in Czechoslovakia, most of them Jewish, from the Nazis in the months leading up to World War II. Winton had visited Prague in December 1938 and saw families and children living in desperate conditions amid an impending Nazi invasion. He decided he must rescue the children right away and send them to safety in Britain. With time running out before the Nazis closed the borders, he compiled a list of as many children as he could and found homes for them in Britain. Yet for decades he was haunted by the fate of the children he was unable to save, always blaming himself for not having done more. Indeed, his humanitarian achievements went unnoticed by the world until 1988, when the BBC discovered the list and invited Winton (now

played by Hopkins) to be in the audience of a live TV show called "That's Life!" The show's host spoke on the air about Winton's work, showed the 50-year-old list and asked if anyone in the audience "owes their life to Nicholas Winton. If so, could you stand up please?" Unbeknownst to Winton, dozens of the men and women around him — the children he had saved — stood up in unison. "As we continue to grapple with today's issues of war, refugee crisis and growing anti-Semitism, the film's relevance is so troubling that you cannot fail to be moved by it." — Rex Reed, Observer. Thank you, Josh, for this beautiful gift.








