

Stewardship Moment

Day 12- Live for your Heavenly Home, not for this life.

For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God.

Hebrews 11:10

"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal, But, store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys, and where thieves do not break in or steal;

What if I told you I'd give you a \$100 bill for every one dollar of Monopoly money that you gave me? This would be quite a good deal for you wouldn't it? You would be saying, "I can give up something that is not really worth anything, and in exchange I receive back something that is really worth a decent amount."

God asks us to view life in a similar way. What He says is this: I have entrusted you with temporary and earthly resources. Your time, your energy, your finances, these are the kinds of blessings He gives us on earth. What God also says, though, is: based on how you handle these temporary blessings; I am willing to give you abundantly more in heaven. If God's children are willing to live generously with what God has given them and to not shrink away from the roles God has called them to play, then truly they can expect treasure in heaven that makes any earthly goods pale in comparison.

Jim Elliot said, "He is no fool who gives up what he cannot keep, to gain that which he cannot lose."

In your heart do you believe what Jesus said in Matt 19:29 that whatever He calls you to give up in this world you can expect 100 times as much in return in heaven? This is not a simple thing but, understand this; Jesus is not saying what you have in this world is worthless. Rather, He is saying that even with how much your worldly things are worth, He can give you so , so much more. We are called to live generously, not because of what we expect in this life; but because of what God promises us in heaven. Life is not so simple as a game of Monopoly. But, then again, the reward that awaits us is infinitely more glorious than a mere \$100 bill.

"I have the watch"


With Christmas quickly approaching, I think about the shepherds who watched over their flocks by night. They would gather all of their sheep together before night and then one of the shepherds would take the first watch for a portion of the night and then the next would do the same. This way one of them would be awake to make sure their flocks were looked after and protected their flocks from danger. This is still carried on today by all of our military. They are protecting our country from other countries that would want to harm us. When I used to stand watch, we would do 4 hours at a time. When we were in port, one of the watches I stood was called the sail watch. I would be perched in the sail of the submarine, fully protected by metal all around me. I would have the advantage of picking off the threat before they knew I was there. This was a position where we protected the sailors that were standing watch topside of the submarine. When I would arrive to relieve the previous watch, they would give me the report of what had been going on the 4 hours they were on watch. I would acknowledge that I understood and we would go over other watch information, like how many rounds of ammo and check the weapons clear. I would then tell the person I was relieving, "I have the watch!!" Once I said that, the responsibility was transferred from him, to me. It was now my responsibility to protect the people below. Our local Public Safety personal and Emergency Service Providers do the same. They look after us locally. We even do this with our own families. Parents are watching over their children. Or maybe they are watching over their elders. One way or another, we all "have the watch". If you know someone that is in this situation and they have no one to share the watch with, try and help share the watch with them!
