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When I had my candidate visit on January 5th, the Rev. Melody Meeter commented that she wished all of RCPE could have read my answers to the RCA Ministerial Profile form I had to submit to become a ministerial candidate in the RCA. At the time I thought, that's not a bad idea! Here's one of the questions asked on the form and my answer:



What caused you to enter ministry, and what are the core values that define your vision for ministry?

Why I entered ministry is a longer, more colorful story I can share more properly in person. But in short, I received an external call to the ministry first and then an internal call followed. My faith journey in Christ began to grow in earnest while I was in college. I was heavily involved in a campus ministry and over time as my gifts for leadership were recognized, I was offered leadership opportunities in campus ministry. Those opportunities then began to grow into greater amounts of responsibility. This in turn led to mentors and peers encouraging me to consider vocational ministry post undergrad. While I had plenty of external calling to ministry, internally I was skeptical of that calling to ministry. While I recognized my success at effectively leading others in their spiritual journey in Christ and my own enthusiasm for my personal journey, I still was not sure I was supposed to enter full time ministry. For several years, I tried very hard to do anything but enter the ministry. It was only after all my other endeavors were thwarted that I gave in and enrolled in seminary to pursue the pastorate. Over my four years of seminary education, my internal call became stronger, and I left seminary confident of my calling to be a pastor in a local church community.

The core value that defines my vision for ministry is that Christ is our Life. Every aspect of who we are as his creatures is that we were created by God's love, for God's love. The gospel of Jesus is multifaceted, but that is the note of the song meant to be struck above all others. God is Love and we are all the beloved of God. This is our fundamental identity from which everything else about us is meant to flow. I often joke that all my sermons the last five or so years are about one thing, I want to convince you that God does in fact actually love you.

The second core value stems from the first, welcome. Father, Son, and Holy Spirit have existed for all eternity in a community that welcomes, celebrates, and serves the other. Created in God's image, we are designed to do the same, to create sacred spaces of welcome and celebration of who we are as the

beloved of God. I spent a lengthy time in my ministry preaching the lectionary gospel texts on Sundays. It struck me in a way that has defined my ministry since that the thing that got Jesus into trouble the most was that he welcomed those that culturally he was not supposed to associate with. The thing that threatened the political and religious leaders the most, was that Jesus refused to participate in their structures of who got to be in and who was out. He regularly subverted the status quo, radically eating with, touching, conversing with, and welcoming into his circle those in power said he should not. His common metaphor for what the kingdom of God is like being a celebratory feast routinely emphasized that God's concern is not if you deserve to be there, but just that you are there. I believe that in our current cultural moment in North America, Jesus' radical welcome is necessary for the Church to regain the ear and confidence of our watching neighbors.

The third core value in my ministry is worship. We are created worshiping, desiring beings. You are what you worship, and you worship what you love, to borrow the phrase from James K. A. Smith. As I alluded to above, weekly gathered worship is the habit at the center of our Christian practice that ripples out into our daily practices of worship. While there are all sorts of habits and practices one can engage in our daily lives, in recent years I have begun to explore and integrate into my personal habits the practices of contemplation. I have found great value in these practices and have begun to share them with others as a priority in my ministry. The combination of weekly gathered worship and daily personal practices of worship are meant to shape and form us to see how all of life is worship. You will worship something. The question is what you will worship. Our habits and practices are what determine the answer to that question.

The fourth core value is the culmination of the first three, witness. Jesus calls us as his followers to be witnesses, living testimonials, to the good news that Jesus is The King of the cosmos, and his rule is one of love. If we are convinced that we are the beloved, welcoming others to come and experience that fundamental truth, practicing together habits of worship that shape our hearts and souls to love God and love our neighbor, then we will inevitably witness to our neighbors the love of God, in both word and deed.

Stewardship Moment

Day 16 – Day 16 – God has good works for you to do in your lifetime

Ephesians 2:10

For we are God's workmanship,

created in Christ to do good works,

which God prepared in advance for us to do?

"What am I doing in life?" This is a question many people ask at many points in their lives. "Why am I here?" "What is my purpose?" Purpose drives us; it helps us understand why we get out of bed each day. When we have an answer to that question of "why," then we understand how to make it through both good and bad times. If we don't have an answer, then life will discourage us, it will confuse us, and it will leave us searching desperately for meaning.

The Bible tells us our purpose is in life: We are alive to glorify God. Paul tells us in Ephesians 2:10 that one of the ways God's children can glorify Him is by doing the good works He has planned out for us. Paul tells us that we were designed to do good works; it is what we are meant for. And over the course of our life in Christ, God has laid out for us a whole plan of good works we get to do.

So Christians are meant to live out these good works. What does that mean? What exactly is a good work? Well, look around you, who do you see every day? Are there things you know you could do to be a blessing to those around you? Assess yourself. What kinds of things do you know how to do? It can be anything from playing music ...to doing manual labor ...to practicing medicine. Maybe you are just a friendly person. Whatever your talents may be, you can be generous with them for someone who is in need.

"Who?" you say? Look into your heart – what do you 'have a heart for?' Do you love children? The elderly? Do you have a heart to fight poverty or help in education? Pursue the things that God has put on your heart.


When we look at the world, we see there are so many good works that we can be doing. Every single day God has equipped you with the purpose and ability to live the generous life you were made for.

MOVIES WITH SPIRIT


April 19, THE DUKE (2020), Episcopal Church of the Messiah, 6436 Montgomery St., Rhine-beck — This is a fun and true story about a surprising real-life art heist. On Aug. 21, 1961, some-

one stole Francisco de Goya's Portrait of the Duke of Wellington from London's National Gallery. It was the gallery's only theft since it opened in 1824. The police think the thief must be a criminal genius, and the public imagines him like the villainous Dr. No in the James Bond movie. Indeed, in that 1962 film, No shows the stolen painting to 007 in his lair. The real art thief reveals himself four years later. He is Kempton Bunton (Jim Broadbent), a 61-year-old cab driver, who says he took the painting to protest the Crown's treatment of the working class. He says he especially wants the government to stop making elderly people pay an annual license fee to watch TV. What happens next is epic and becomes fabled. 
