Continuing from the May Reformer, here are some more answers to the questions I had to answer during the candidating process of the RCA.

Name three of your most passionate hopes for the Church at large, and why they are significant to you.



My most passionate hope for the Church is to recover the fundamental truth of the gospel of Jesus, that we are created by God's love, for God's love. The question that should be driving the Church today is, "What does love require?" Rather than being driven by a defense of Truth, however one defines their version of the capital "T" truth, or driven by the Church being Pure, however they define purity, I hope to see the Church be driven by what does the love of Jesus require of us in our context.

I also hope for the Church to embrace what Jesus meant when he said to take up his cross and follow him. Jesus' incarnation shows us that the path to shalom (life, wholeness, flourishing) takes on a cruciform shape. The universal pattern of the cosmos is that the path to resurrection life must first go through death. The only way to obtain life is first you must die. Jesus' birth, life, ministry, teaching, passion, and death all show us that one wins by losing. That the path to ascent must first go through descent. We are a culture obsessed with winning. We are a culture where we as individuals and then in our tribes must be right above all costs. We can not stomach defeat. Our egos must be defended against all others. And the American Church is guilty of this mentality and has actively participated in this game for a long, long time. Yet, Jesus' own example is that winning comes by losing. I'd like to see the Church in our culture try that on for a while and see if it doesn't produce more effective witness to the gospel than always trying to "win".

I think if the Church at large can be committed to asking itself what does the love of Jesus require, and embrace that to follow Jesus is to embrace a cruciform pattern of life, then I hope the American Church can therefore become more honest about the ways it has been and still is complicit in intertwining the Christian faith in forms of racism, patriarchy, capitalism, xenophobia, homophobia, and the destruction of our environment . Perhaps if we can begin to name our failures in these ways, allow our collective

Church ego to appropriately die where it needs to, then we can begin to disentangle the Church from our society's unhealthy and destructive ways.

These three hopes of mine for the Church are significant to me because I believe that without them, the Church in the United States of America will continue to decline. Our neighbors do not see a difference between the Church and the world they live in every day. Therefore, why would they listen to what Christianity has to say and why would they voluntarily join such an organization to give their time and money to it? It isn't providing them with any different answers than what they can find on their news feeds, their podcasts, their reading lists, their affinity tribes, their politics, and their echo chambers. A radical love expressed by lives of honest, humble sacrifice on behalf of others is what I believe obedience to Christ as an institution will look like in our age. This is required if we ever as a Church want our neighbors to listen to what we have to say and fill our pews for gathered worship again.

Day 16 – Day 16 – God has good works for you to do in your lifetime

Ephesians 2:10

For we are God's workmanship,

created in Christ to do good works,

which God prepared in advance for us to do?

"What am I doing in life?" This is a question many people ask at many points in their lives. "Why am I here?" "What is my purpose?" Purpose drives us; it helps us understand why we get out of bed each day. When we have an answer to that question of "why," then we understand how to make it through both good and bad times. If we don't have an answer, then life will discourage us, it will confuse us, and it will leave us searching desperately for meaning.

The Bible tells us our purpose is in life: We are alive to glorify God. Paul tells us in Ephesians 2:10 that one of the ways God's children can glorify Him is by doing the good works He has planned out for us. Paul tells us that we were designed to do good works; it is what we are meant for. And over the course of our life in Christ, God has laid out for us a whole plan of good works we get to do.

So Christians are meant to live out these good works. What does that mean? What exactly is a good work? Well, look around you, who do you see every day? Are there things you know you could do to be a blessing to those around you? Assess yourself. What kinds of things do you know how to do? It can be anything from playing music ...to doing manual labor ...to practicing medicine. Maybe you are just a friendly person. Whatever your talents may be, you can be generous with them for someone who is in need.

"Who?" you say? Look into your heart – what do you 'have a heart for?' Do you love children? The elderly? Do you have a heart to fight poverty or help in education? Pursue the things that God has put on your heart.

When we look at the world, we see there are so many good works that we can be doing. Every single day God has equipped you with the purpose and ability to live the generous life you were made for.

Four Biblical Mothers to Remember this Month

We hope you'll take some time this month to pay respects to your mother—or if that isn't possible, to somebody in your life who embodies the grace and wisdom we associate with godly mothers. Attached is a list of four famous moms from the Bible, along with a list of some of our best devotions for moms.

The Bible speaks highly of mothers who raise children and guide their families in a righteous manner; in the oft-quoted Proverbs 31, the "wife of noble character" is honored by her husband and children for her virtues.

Motherhood wasn't a requirement for godly women in Bible times—and just as today, not every woman who wanted children was granted her wish. But the mothers and matriarchs of the Bible exhibit qualities that all of us, male or female, parent or not, should strive to emulate. Here are a few of the famous mothers of the Bible, with links to their stories:

1. Mary, the Mother of Jesus

Perhaps no more famous mother exists than Mary, who at a young age learned from an angel that she would give birth to the long-awaited Messiah. Her song of praise in response, and the well-known events of Christ's birth, are what usually spring to mind when we think of Mary. But her role as mother brought her grief as well as joy; we can only imagine what it must have been like for her to witness Jesus' crucifixion. Read her story in John 19.

2. Elizabeth

Mary's was not the only miraculous birth recorded in the New Testament. Elizabeth was a godly woman who was "righteous in the sight of God, observing all the Lord's commands and decrees blamelessly"—and yet she and her husband were unable to conceive a child. God answered her prayers late in her life and she gave birth to John the Baptist, but is perhaps best known for her prophetic encouragement of the young (and perhaps frightened) Mary: "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the child you will bear! But why am I so favored, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? As soon as the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the baby in my womb leaped for joy. Blessed is she who has believed that the Lord would fulfill his promises to her!" Read her story in Luke 1.

3. Hannah

Hannah is one of the most inspiring mothers in the Bible, although her story is less well-known. Despite years of patience and prayer, she remained unable to have a child. One day "in her deep anguish Hannah prayed to the LORD, weeping bitterly"—and God answered her prayer at last. But Hannah's character truly shone when, in gratitude to God, she dedicated her newborn son to His service. Her son would one day become one of Israel's greatest prophets. Read her story in 1 Samuel 1.

4. Sarah, the Wife of Abraham

Sarah is one of the great matriarchs of the Bible—yet she didn't become a mother until very late in life. In fact, her reaction to God's promise that she would have a son was to laugh, as memorably recorded in Genesis 18. Nevertheless she did give birth to a son, and her lineage would include Jesus Christ himself. Read her story in Genesis 18.

There are many more famous mothers described in the Bible; many of them righteous, some not so much, but all used by God to bring about His design. This month, as we give thanks for the mothers in our lives, consider how you can embody the traits that define a godly mother—patience, kindheartedness, faithfulness—and consider how you can encourage the mothers in your community, young and old, as they work to meet that same standard.

He is risen! He is risen indeed! Halleluiah!








